Gatsby Benchmarks

In 2018, the government released a new careers strategy and statutory guidance for schools and colleges. It put an increased focus on using the Gatsby Benchmarks as a framework for best practice around which we can build our own careers provision.

The eight Gatsby Benchmarks of good career guidance

1. A stable careers programme
2. Learning from career and labour market information
3. Addressing the needs of each pupil
4. Linking curriculum learning to careers
5. Encounters with employers and employees
6. Experiences of workplaces
7. Encounters with further and higher education
8. Personal guidance

UHS Careers Programme Progression Framework:

Year Group	Aim	Outcomes
Year 7 – Who am I ?	To raise awareness about jobs and careers options available. To inspire, whilst developing key skills and looking at their strengths	Gained an insight into their own strengths and how to develop new skills. They will demonstrate this by listing their strengths and demonstrating an awareness of how to develop new skills that will help them in their career. List different types of jobs and careers out in the world of work that they might be interested in, based on their strengths and interests.
